
The "Well Connected" Skype Project

Where are we located?

The Mackay Hospital and Health Service is 1000 klms North of Brisbane and is responsible for the delivery of public hospital and health services including medical, surgical, emergency, obstetrics, paediatrics, specialist outpatient clinics, mental health, critical care and clinical support services to a population of around 180,424 people residing in a geographical area from Bowen in the North to St Lawrence in the south and from the coast inland to Clermont in the west, Bowen in the north and Collinsville in the north-west. The Whitsunday Islands in the east are also included in this region and include Lindeman, Hamilton and Brampton Islands.

Why?

- A unique aspect of life in the Mackay Health Service District is that a large percentage of the population work away from home on a regular basis due to the employment requirement of the district's mining and rural industries.
- The "Well Connected" project opens new and exciting avenues for patient support and the evidence suggests that treating teams should identify the patient's key supports, and enhance their level of involvement in order to maximise patient outcomes.
- The "Well Connected" project will also support patients with loved ones serving military postings overseas as armed forces personal serving overseas are provided with assess to Skype facilities.

How?

- □ Through funding from the Mackay Hospital Foundation, Allied Health's, Social Work Service is kicking off a new project called "Well Connected", using Skype to help connect hospital patients with family members and friends who are unable to visit in person.
- □ The "Well Connected" project was launched on World Social Work Day (20th March 2012) and is available across the Mackay Hospital & Health Service.

QI Activity

- "Video calling in the hospital has removed both geographical, and in this case, physical barriers by allowing patients who can't leave the hospital to have face-to-face conversations."
- "Skype video calling has helped the healing process among many patients by eliminating a sense of isolation that patients sometimes feel."
- "By having access to Skype enabled laptops, patients are able to reach out and talk to family and friends, whenever they are feeling lonely".

Through funding from the Mackay Hospital Foundation, the Allied Health Social Work Department has introduced a new incentive "Well Connected". This program allows patients to Skype video and voice calls that allow patients to get in contact with loved ones. Video calling in the hospital means that:

- Patients feel more at ease and supported therefore more able to focus on their recovery.
- Patients remain in contact with family and friends who are unable to visit in person.
- · Reduces isolation for patients
- Maintaining contact in adverse weather events such as Flooding or Cyclones

Mackay Base Hospital social worker and project manager of Well Connected Nancy Young said Skype would allow patients to connect to family and friends who were unable to vi-

"The sense of isolation in hospital is minimised using this technology, and patients feel more at ease during their stay with us," she said.

"Maintaining access to support networks can be limited due to the size of the Mackay Health Service District, especially when patients are transferred from outlying district hospitals for treatment and family members are unable to temporary relocate or maintain a regular visiting sche-

Skype provides additional support for home dialysis patients

- □ Increasing number of patients choosing home haemodialysis due to the tyranny of distance.
- □ Until recently standard support consisted of regular telephone contact and home visits
- □ Introduction of Skype allows:
 - More comprehensive support
 - Improved level of communication
 - Direct visualisation of the patient, machine and environment
 - Facilitates quick & effective trouble shooting
 - Reduces cost to patient and service provider
 - Improves patient outcomes
 - A more efficient service delivery model allows for re-allocation of resources

Setting up Skype

- Not possible to use Skype on Qld Health network
- Concerns about confidentiality and viruses
- Local Kidney Patient's Association agreed to fund project
- Bought laptop/tablet with camera and helped install Skype
- Unable to use hospital phone lines so separate BT line was installed

Potential uses of Renal Skype


Support for patients

- Needling
- Machine problems/alarms
- Problems with circuitry
- Experiential assessment
- Encouragement and reassurance, reduction of anxiety
- Environmentally friendly

- Saves miles and time!
- Reassuring for staff to be able to see patient, machine and environment

Patient comments


- DK 'Like having a nurse at home with me'

Impact on patient efficacy


- Instant problem solving, nurse can see what is happening
- Reassuring patient feels that the nurse can see what they are doing and that they are not alone
- Empowers them to be independent and gives confidence, especially when they first start at home

Future potential

- Provide equipment for patients who are unable to fund their own.
- Explore possibility of connection via other programs
- Set up and maintenance costs provided by a national communication carrier and organisations such as Kidney Health Australia
- Skype applications now available on smart phones
- Skype can be built into the dialysis machine and also automatically monitor machine function which can be remotely assessed by dialysis staff.
- Data base of patient problems and solutions
- Research project potential
